I was completely covered in balloons, and well and truly was one too, I still have pictures in some family albums."

Isle of Thrills: Phillip Island Adventure Camp Delivers High-Flying Fun and Exceptional Conduct!

Early on the morning of Monday 26 February 2024, our year 7 students assembled on the tennis courts, anticipating the journey to Phillip Island Adventure Camp. South-east of Cowes, Phillip Island Adventure Camp, is a pretty resort with nice cabins, pools, a lake, forest and countless Cape Barren geese.

The flying foxes, giant swings, laser strike, and countless opportunities to bond with our new classmates and teachers all excited us, and the energy was at an absolute high!

Students took part in high ropes which tested our strength and balance at about 5 metres above ground, but we conquered our fears of the heights, scaling a 10-metre-high tower to ride on twin 200 metre long flying foxes.

There was also a scary drop slide and a clever waterfall that stopped when you clapped. FYI: I did the high ropes course five times in a row - a new record!





Buzz Question



This edition's buzz question is:

"What do you think of the new double periods?"

Some positives are:

- It's great to get lots of work done, and it is also good for senior school assessments or extended work pieces.
- Teachers said that some SACs used to be forced to happen after school and now due to double periods, it is easier to do longer SACs or even hurdles for senior classes. Tasks such as essays can take much longer to complete, especially when students first learn how to write extended pieces of work.
- Double periods can also help students and teachers to complete more work. When we need to get notes done or revise for assessments, double periods can help give us more time to get this done.

On the other hand, some negatives are:

- Doubles can be repetitive, an information overload or can be very tiring.
- When doubles are together or split, they can feel as though it is repeating the same work over and over or even feel like Groundhog Day, overwhelming students and making the day less fun.

- Especially when they are together, a break is needed between the 2 periods to keep us sane throughout the 2 hours of learning.
- Double periods are a long time to be learning for, and we often end up doing less work when we have doubles as we cannot focus for the full 2 periods.

Are split or together doubles preferred?

- Students and staff both said that it depends on what you want to get done during the time.
- Split doubles are good because you can have a break in between, but they also feel repetitive as it can feel like the day is happening twice.
- Doubles together are great for sacs, hurdle tasks or extended work (e.g. essays), especially in senior classes. If we do work that we know will take more than 1 period, it is great to do it in a double together as it can be a great in-between for single classes and 2 classes.

Overall, we found that people like the new double periods, but it depends on what is getting done as to whether the doubles are better split or together.



Remember, even when learning does feel like a competition, it's not a race against anyone else. Rather, it is about challenging ourselves, pushing ourselves, and allowing the talent, skill, and support of others to help us move to the next level and get the most out of our own potential.

- Getting an early head start on content before a lesson is useful.
 - Whether this is reading through the textbook to get your head wrapped around a concept or watching Edrolo's, as it's easy to feel overwhelmed by the amount of content you have to learn
- For senior students using Edrolo, there are printable practise tests/exams for each AOS/test/exam.

- **Google Scholar** is an excellent search engine online that:
 - filters down articles.
 - Analyses highly cited literature works and materials for almost everything academic.

It is a must have tool for students when researching!



VCE Tips:

Read the study Design! - It is expected that students are to read the study design for their VCE subjects, however many people do not do this.

The study design exists for a reason!


- It gives a brief introduction on what each area of study in a Unit are about.
- It tells you what you need and don't need to know about a topic.
 - (VERY IMPORTANT some subjects have topics that are extremely long and detailed; making it confusing for you to figure out what to revise on for upcoming exams/SAC's - VCAA tells you exactly what you need and don't need to know).
 - This saves you time and energy to spend it on more important topics!


