As you know, Brentwood Secondary College is an outstanding school and one of the leading public schools in the North Eastern Region. As the School Council President, I share your pride in our school.

Brentwood is sought after by families within and beyond our local area. This is as a result of providing not only high-class learning opportunities in the classroom but outstanding experiences in the arts, sport, leadership, music and a large number of extra-curricular opportunities. Supporting this is a well resourced Wellbeing Team and Library.

Our aim is to continually improve our school to ensure Brentwood is the best learning environment for all of our students. To achieve this, it takes support from everyone in our community.

The Department of Education and Training (DET), provide Brentwood with funding for tuition and the everyday running of the school. However, it is your contributions that have ensured the school is able to provide the high-quality holistic learning environment that gives our students the best opportunity to fulfill their potential as learners and people. This enables our students to be well prepared for their next steps after Year 12.

Parent contributions ensure that the following programs and resources are able to be maintained by the College:

- Our comprehensive Wellbeing Team which is resourced beyond other local schools. It includes five non-teaching staff and a College Chaplain which the school funds. This team provides support to all students, staff and parents in our community.
- State of the art ICT infrastructure to support student learning. The school has its own dedicated internet and filtering software in addition to what the Department of Education and Training provides to ensure students are able to access their learning programs anytime, anywhere.
- Extra support staff to supervise and provide First Aid, gardening, facilities management and ICT support to ensure the best possible services and learning environment can be maintained.
- A welcoming and friendly library with three non-teaching staff who support teachers and students by providing a quiet study space and support with accessing valuable learning resources.
- Sporting, Performing Arts, Music and other resources that support both the curriculum and co-curricular programs.
- School musical and performing arts productions. These programs are award-winning and highly respected in the local and wider community.
- The delivery of our large sports program that continues to achieve outstanding results and provides our students with a wide range of opportunities.
- Elective subjects such as Food Studies, Drama, Art Making and Exhibiting, Media, Visual Communication and Product Design.

In the past, these contributions have also enabled the school to invest in the Thinking, Learning and Creativity (TLC) Centre at Year 7, construct a new College Gymnasium, Upgrade the Science Learning Area and northern courtyard, Construct a new Wellbeing Centre, House Hub and other capital works projects at the school. In 2023 we will be constructing new outdoor learning spaces adjacent to our new \$4.6 million dollar Senior Learning Centre, in K-Block and next to the old Senior Learning Centre Building. These spaces will have new locker bays, outdoor furniture and gardens to improve the school environment for our students. We are also be upgrading the school library space to provide more contemporary learning spaces for students.

As you can see, your generous support is critical to the success of our school. The school council is a professional governing body of the school, made up of parents, students and staff. As a council, we oversee the diligent allocation of all school resources and I can assure you that all resources are utilised to enhance the learning opportunities for our students.

ONE PAGE OVERVIEW



FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.



PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

- Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

- Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
